From the Administrator, Sigmund Freud on Religious Faith

We come across some thinkers of the post-Enlightenment world who wrestled with the concept of God and who had generally a negative view of religion. Some philosophers and psychologists tried to minimize the reality of God simply to some kind of human wish-fulfillment. Ludwig Feuerbach's (1804-1872) and Sigmund Freud's (1856-1939) views on religion were used increasingly in anti-Christian propaganda.

Feuerbach, a prominent German philosopher and an anthropologist, offered a critical analysis on religion. He was best known for his most important work *The Essence of Christianity*, which provided a critique of Christianity. This work strongly influenced generations of later thinkers, including Karl Marx. Feuerbach noted that the deities that human beings believe are nothing more than something produced by a highly active imagination. They are merely the projected images of human nature. His basic thesis was that "Religion is the dream of human mind." In other words, according to him, human beings created their gods in their own images. And so, gods are mere mental or psychological projections of human nature. The basic thesis of Feuerbach was that gods were psychological projections of human nature.

Same way, Sigmund Freud, the father of psychoanalysis and a convinced atheist, contributed to atheism through his theories, especially through psychoanalysis. Though Freud tried to offer both a psychological and a historical explanation for the origins of religious beliefs, he also believed that religion was a great hindrance to society. In his later works he wrote that religion may be altogether disregarded. He believed that the doctrines of religion carry with them the beliefs of the times that they were originated. He considered those times as ignorant childhood days of human race. Therefore, he proposed that if humanity needs to be more civilized, it needs to be set free of those religious illusions. Also, he suggested that societies need to construct a better order than religion could give it.

Freud wrestled with the question, "If there is no God, why is there religion?" He, in his works tried to bring out his observations on religious rites as something similar to the obsessive actions of neurotic patients. Basically, he declared that religion was a distorted form of an obsessive neurosis. As an atheist, he mostly rejected the existence of God and called belief in a God a psychological neurosis or distress. Just like Feuerbach, he tried to reduce God to a dream of man and set out to prove that religion is merely a product of the mind, like an illusion. Freud being a materialist, made an attempt to reduce human beings to her/his body. Then, he tried to reduce the human body to animal desire, desire to sexual desire, and sexual desire to physical sexual act.

Charles Darwin in his *theory of biological evolution* spoke about a world that appears to be a cruel one in which the weak and maimed creatures were crushed out of existence for the survival of the most "fit enough" (Survival of the fittest). Freud, too spoke about certain restrictions imposed on any living species, especially on humans by civilization. According to his understanding, those restrictions, specifically the restrictions on individual desires, are necessary for mutual survival of individuals in a society. Without those societal restrictions, a human person is left in the brutal state of nature where only the strongest can survive. Then, he concluded that in the face of threat of nature and helplessness of weak living creatures, society is born. In *The Future of an Illusion*, Freud stated, "The principle task of civilization is to defend us against nature." Then, he also understood that those restrictions were critical factors in the emergence of religion. In other words, Freud believed that religion arose as a response to human beings' fear of the forces of natural disasters, disease and illness, death, and to their frustration in the face of an oppressive human civilization. Therefore, he stated that religion offers human beings the comforting reality, such as God and the promise of a rewarding after-life for enduring suffering. In that way, Freud called that the belief in a God as an expression of psychological neurosis or distress motivated by the "longing for a father." In another sense, Freud thought religion is the way that adults think about a god, just as the way that small children think about their parents. Thus, he thought that the key elements in all religions are the veneration of a father figure, such as God or Jesus. However, in the case of Freud, he did not consider the positive and mysterious experiences of many other religious persons, and sound text books on religion to get to his own conclusions on religious faith. Rather, he looked into the complexities of the human psyche done with abnormal and neurotic persons, which itself can have limitations. Therefore, many psychologists do not believe that his analysis of religion is applicable to every person.

There is no doubt that Freud has been helpful to the intellectual world in showing that humankind has a dimension of religious inclinations. However, we cannot conclude that there is no comforting reality such as God. More than just finding comforts through a benevolent father figure (God), some highly religious and spiritual persons have renounced worldly comforts voluntarily for the sake of God. And some even went to the extreme of embracing more suffering for the love of God. Freud himself has admitted that certain unpleasant experiences he suffered in encountering his own father, Jacob Freud may have predisposed a negative understanding towards God who is compared to a father figure. Although Freud and some psychologists have a generally negative view of religious beliefs, there are other psychologists who have explored the fact; how religious faith can have a positive influence on a person's life.
