Stages of Grief – (3) Anger and Bargaining

Suffering can be the outcome of a major loss or a significant change in life. Going through an experience of grieving after a major loss is unique to each survivor since every person grieves differently. Just as no two lives are the same, so will each loss of a person will be, especially in death. Our experience may dramatically differ depending on how close we were to the person who has passed. In our coping with this process of grieving, there is another stage, which can be called anger and bargaining. Psychiatrist, Dr. Elisabeth Kubler-Ross in her book, *On Death and Dying*, proposed these two stages as so important to go through in the process of grieving.

Sometimes people that are grieving often become upset with the person or situation, which put them into that state of grief. After all, the life of a survivor could now be in complete disarray. In those situations, rage, anger, and hostility are another common response to trauma. Anger can derive from feelings of frustration, helplessness, and uncontrollable circumstances generated by the process of death. It can be directed toward the event itself, one who is cause of the trauma, and at others who do not seem to understand. For instance, anger can be directed toward doctors and nurses who were unable to save, family and friends, and at God. The question, "Why me?" can be posed against God, oneself, and others in anger. The person who goes through death may resent the fact that others will remain healthy and alive while she/he must die. Even the close survivors may get angry toward the deceased for leaving them behind and putting them in a situation that they are unable to cope. God can become a special target for anger since He is regarded as allowing the tragedy to happen.

Survivors can become angry at themselves if they feel they could have done something more to stop the loss from happening. Also, anger also can be self-directed when recovery is slow. Anger may lead a person to isolate oneself from one another. However, anger can be understood and sometimes justified as a measure of your love for the person. In certain occasions, anger should be expressed rather than suppressed or denied in order to resolve some questions.

When anger doesn't get them anywhere then the affected may begin to bargain. The bargaining stage may occur prior to loss as well as after loss. In one way, bargaining can be described as an attempt to negotiate pain away. "Yes me, but..." Attitudes may lead persons to accept the fact of death, but, again strike bargaining for more time. One can find oneself asking questions like, "what if," thinking about what could have been done to save your loved one. One can bargain, "May be if I could have gone back to Church and started praying, his cancer would have gone away." Perhaps, one can bargain with God or others. "If I could have just one more day with them..." This way, bargaining can also be often accompanied by guilt. This is basically a way of negotiating with the hurt and pain of the loss. And bargaining is very normal and considered to be a sign that the suffering one beginning to comprehend the situation. Mostly, many people begin to bargain with God in facing tragedy and death. However, to address God even in anger is an act of confidence. This trust may show that her/his sorrow and suffering have not driven God away.

In order to go through the stages of anger and bargaining, we need to come to a realization that there are things that we cannot control or change in life. Especially, no one has control of death. And death and dying remind us of our human vulnerability in spite of all our modern medical and technological advances. We have received life from God and should be nurtured by Him. We need to be humble enough to admit that none of us could control our destiny. Modern technological and medical advances may delay the approaching death, but will never allow us to escape from it.

We are called to face our feelings of anger and bargaining honestly, admit them that they are their even against God, talk about them with people who can understand, confessing them to God, and ask for His help. We should not allow anger and the attitude of bargaining to control our lives. With the grace of God, if we can handle anger and guilt, much depression, which is another stage of grieving can be prevented. We need to ask God to help us to know our human limitations, forget the past, forgive those who have sinned against the nature of life, and forgive ourselves.

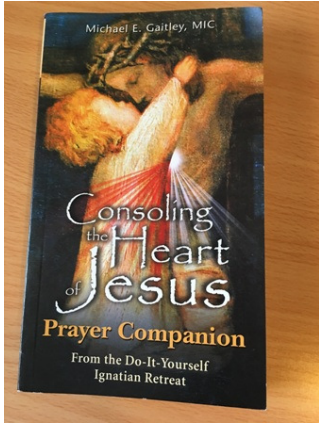
